# A message from former Councilmember Aislinn Palmer



When I moved to
Port Townsend
in 2016, I did
not know
anything about
Comprehensive
Plans or how

they affect our lives.

I was involved in housing activism and kept hearing about how zoning and regulations were impacting the housing crisis, but it wasn't clear to me then how anyone participated. The Port Townsend plan update was over before I figured it out, but

I was able to attend a few public meetings for the Jefferson County plan update, and it inspired me to keep getting involved. When I joined the Port Townsend Planning Commission in 2018 the breadth of the Comprehensive Plan finally took shape for me, driving home how the next update would mark an incredible opportunity to shape the next 20 years of development in Port Townsend. Our Comprehensive Plan can be rooted in concepts of equity and accessibility, rather than exclusion and extraction, if we want it to be.

That update is happening now, and the process is more transparent and accessible than any previous update. The current staff are worldclass in both skill and compassion - they are capable of meaningful, groundbreaking work that can both change the course of Port Townsend and be an example for other communities throughout the state, where the time and cost of code updates often necessitates copying others. Port Townsend may be small compared to other jurisdictions, but it is perfectly situated to lead on these issues. Continued on next page

# A message from City Manager John Mauro

Our community knows how to celebrate and have fun. It's part of the joy of living here and it happens regularly throughout

the year. The City team plays a key role in ensuring events are safe and successful – but we don't often organize many of these celebrations ourselves.

This month is different. We're throwing a party to celebrate the completion of the Discovery Road project. It's been a long road (0.6 miles and six years in the making) – but we're nearly there.

On Saturday, June 15, we invite you, your family, and your friends to experience and explore this remarkable neighborhood streets project. We'll provide food, drinks, music, games, and a few surprises. Let's celebrate together one of Port Townsend's biggest transportation projects in our history!

Taking on a multi-year, large, and complex project like this took sustained collaboration within our teams, with important agency partners, and with our federal



and state funding agencies (most of this \$5.5 million project was grant-funded). It also took regular coordination, communication, and collaboration with community members who live nearby and all of us who use Discovery Road regularly. The project has been a fusion of intense planning, deep engagement, piles of paperwork and reporting, and frequent trouble-shooting – and much of that was before the first shovel went into the ground!

It's been satisfying and inspiring to watch the construction make

daily progress on the sidewalks, bikeway, enhanced pedestrian crossings, landscaping, street lighting, stormwater, and wetland enhancements. Each step forward confirms that this small community can do big things if we think big, plan ahead, enthusiastically collaborate, and word hard.

Thank you for your patience as we head toward the finish line together and take on our last task: the celebration!

### With spring rains and sun, it's time to MOW the ROW!

ROW stands for Right-of-Way and it's the public space between your property and the street that property owners are responsible for maintaining. Street crews mowing our city right-of-ways went from 1,800 hours

in 2022 to 140 hours in 2023. This means street crews can now focus more time on street improvements and maintenance, like stormwater work, filling potholes, street repair, and sewer inspections. # **Visitor Information** Services take a collaborative approach for 2024

Fort Worden Hospitality, Port Townsend Main Street, and Key City Public Theatre have come together to provide information services to visitors and residents in Port Townsend this year. After the closure of the Port Townsend Visitor Center, previously operated by the Chamber of Jefferson County, the City's Lodging Tax Advisory Committee (LTAC) discussed a new, collaborative model that could quickly be mobilized to support visitors to Port Townsend. These three key partners will continue to provide essential services to travelers in traditional and non-traditional ways. Fort Worden Hospitality will leverage its 7-days-aweek front desk to help direct visitors to the sights and scenes of PT, and Main Street will employ an innovative bike cart and friendly greeter to serve people at downtown gathering places on weekends. Key City Public Theatre will service the event readerboard you see as you head into and out of town along Highway 20.

LTAC's vision of sustainable tourism is to reinvest community resources to enhance the lives of both residents and visitors. If you are at Fort Worden, or spending time downtown, check out the maps and information offered by these services and provide your quests with new resources, or explore your big backyard in a new way.

# **Tyler & Lawrence Street** about to ramp up!

This summer, work on Lawrence and Tyler Streets in Uptown Port Townsend will begin, a project that will remove barriers to access in the Uptown Business District. The project, anticipated to begin construction in August, will include paving and installing new ADA compliant wheelchair ramps on Tyler Street, repairing sidewalks and installing bulbouts and wheel chair ramps on Lawrence Street, and installing a new bus stop at the corner of Lawrence and Tyler.

### **How Streets Are Built**


7 p.m. Thursday, June 27 Carnegie Reading Room Port Townsend Public Library

SUMMER RATE CHANGE

Irrigation water has returned to Summer rate pricing, effective May 1, 2024. The price per 1,000 gallons consumed will go from \$4.57 to \$9.55 (inside city limits) and from \$5.48 to \$11.46 (outside city limits). If you are an irrigation water customer, you will see this change reflected on your May 31, 2024 billing statement.
